


### What is the Montana Fish & Wildlife Conservation Trust?

The Montana Fish & Wildlife Conservation Trust (Public Law 105-277) was established by the United States Congress in 1998, and was funded from the sale of federally leased cabin sites on Canyon Ferry Reservoir. The purpose of this trust is to provide a permanent source of funding for the • Enhance public

acquisition of publicly accessible land in Montana in order to:

- Restore and conserve Improve public access fisheries habitat, included riparian habitat;
- Restore and conserve at \$14,945,403. wildlife habitat:

hunting, fishing and recreation opportunities;



The assets of the Trust as of 12/31/12 are \$19,253,266 with grants funded from interest generated by the principal. Two independent oversight boards, a Joint State-Federal Board and a Citizen's Advisory Board, are responsible for ensuring the goals of the Trust are met. The Trust Manager ensures that Trust funds are used for projects that meet the intent of the legislation. Board meetings are open to the public and public participation is encouraged.
